Our chamber music season began with the Winter Chamber Program in January. Seven groups rehearsed weekly for 10-14 weeks. On April 15, Maureen Yuen from Drake University and Ho Anthony Ahn from Kansas came to give masterclasses for all the groups. We concluded with a wonderful concert in Wilson Auditorium on April 18. Thank you to the coaches who helped make this possible: Dominique Archambeau, Lisa Guttenberg, Hannah Howland Jacobs, Michael Klyce, and Sonja Zeithamel. A big thank you also goes to Associated Chamber Music Players (ACMP) for the grant we received for this program.



On April 28, several of the Winter Chamber Program groups performed an informal concert in Walder Hall for the Thursday and Friday group classes.

On May 21, three seniors were recognized at graduation for their commitment to chamber music during their junior and senior high school years at Preucil. Congratulations again to Adrian Bostian, Haoran Wu, and Adam Zeithamel.

Summer Chamber Fest was the grand finale of our chamber music cycle. Twenty-eight students gathered at North Campus for a week of intensive study from June 25 – July 1. We welcomed Empire Wild back for the opening performance and jam classes. Students also participated and observed masterclasses led by Elizabeth Oakes and Empire Wild. Preucil alum, Edmond Henning, led a fiddle class for the violins and violas. The daily schedule consisted of coachings, supervised practices, jam classes, composition and improvisation workshop, orchestra, and viola for violinists. The final concert was held on July 1 and featured all eight chamber groups, the orchestra led by Linda Judiesch, the composition and improvisation workshop led by Ramin Roshandel, and the jam classes led by Empire Wild. A huge thank you to all the faculty and clinicians who made the week such a success: Amy Redhage, Edmond Henning, Elizabeth Oakes, Empire Wild (Ken Kubota and Mitch Lyon), Hannah Yang, Laura Shaw, Linda Judiesch, Marit Hervig, Mary Neumann, and Ramin Roshandel.

Our established piano quartet coached by Michael Klyce had two wonderful masterclass opportunities in April: Annie Fullard from the Cavani Quartet and Maureen Yuen from Drake University.

Our students gain so much musically and personally by participating in chamber music. Jacob Newton, a senior at Preucil, shared his thoughts about chamber music with me: "Doing chamber music helped me to realize how much fun it is to create music with other people. There's some of that in orchestra, but in a small ensemble, everyone is responsible for contributing to the group interpretation—you're truly crafting the music. It was an honor to work with three other musicians who all had meaningful contributions to what we did as an ensemble. I also feel like my ears were refined—I had to listen not only to the others in the ensemble, but also know exactly what I sounded like, which was definitely a challenge. As I'm working on my solo repertoire now, I can clearly see how participating in chamber music has made me a better musician."

um, we took time to learn about some of the artists that we would see. We read biographical picture books about artists Jackson Pollock, Alma Thomas, Yayoi Kusama, Joan Miro, and Henri Matisse, then made art inspired by their styles. I laid out huge mural papers on the playground and we made collaborative action paintings with different tools, like Pollock. We used dots to create abstract compositions, like Kusama. We painted with watercolors, using bright colors and brushstrokes aligned like Thomas.

We also spent time learning art museum rules and etiquette. Many of the students had been to hands-on museums like the Children's Museum before, but maybe not to an art museum. We discussed why we visit an art museum—to be inspired! Even the three-year-olds understood why enjoying the art with our eyes was ok, but we needed to keep our hands from reaching out to touch it, to protect the artwork. Our Reggio-inspired preschool philosophy respects children as full-

fledged humans, capable of being active members in the community. Our visits to the Stanley were fun adventures, and a wonderful way to put the philosophy into action.

Senior graduation took place on Sunday evening, May 21, in Wilson Auditorium. The evening's speaker was Mary E. Larew from the Preucil School Class of 2001. Many of Mary's formative memories took place at the Preucil School of Music from the age of 4 through graduation from high school. Her studies in violin with Sonja Zeithamel, then Doris Preucil; piano with Debra Hernstrom; and chamber music with cellist David Evenchick at PSM provided a perfect foundation for what would evolve into a rich and varied career in music.

Mary is now an accomplished violinist, an award-winning composer, and a seasoned arts administrator. She moved to Saint Paul a year ago with her family, from Connecticut, where her professional experience included serving as a teaching artist, Suzuki Violin instructor, music director, and in multiple administrative roles at community music organizations, including as Executive Director of the Danbury Music Center. Mary holds a degree from Oberlin Conservatory in Music Composition, a Master of Arts degree from Teachers College of Columbia University in Arts Administration, and a Ph.D. in Directing Me-

dieval Music Dramas from the University of York. Currently she serves as the Executive Director of the Saint Paul Conservatory of Music. Mary lives with her husband and son Pascal in Saint Paul, MN where she continues the traditions she learned at the Preucil School of Music as a Suzuki parent. Following is Mary's message to the graduates.

Good evening. It is a tremendous honor to be here tonight. I was sitting where you were sitting now in 2001, and the day after tomorrow I will be 40.

I am so grateful to have studied with Sonja Zeithamel and Deb Hernstrom from the age of about 4 years old - although with Deb I had to start twice because the first time I tried piano lessons I was too shy to speak a word or to touch the piano. But after a break of a year or two, I begged my parents to return to piano lessons with Deb and am so grateful I did!

I am also thankful to have studied with Doris Preucil in high school, and to have had opportunities to play in orchestras, string quartets, and Espressivo Strings.

Anywhere I go in the music industry, if I mention that I studied at the Preucil School of Music, people are impressed and assume that I know what I'm talking about!

Tonight I wanted to consider the Mantra: Where love is deep, much can be accomplished.

Commencement is a time when many of us reflect on the chapters we have lived, and the chapters that are in our future. There are times in every life when the way forward is clear, and when the way forward is not clear.

When you feel called to pursue a particular future, that is tremendously valuable and it is to be cherished and protected. I encourage you to follow your inspiration, and to pursue it relentlessly - to love it deeply, for when love is deep, much can be accomplished.

At the same time, I want you to be liberated from a false understanding that we can plan our futures in detail, and that we can decide everything that will happen in our lives. In part, it is true that we can decide, but it's also not true, and many of the most interesting people I know, and people whom I respect the most, have changed their paths many times over the course of their careers. Some of these highly and diversely accomplished people are my peers, and remember, I'm only 40 on Tuesday.

I'd speculate that in each of our lives we will experience those times when we know exactly what we want to do, and also those times when we feel lost or uncertain of what we wish to do, and in those uncertain times I encourage each of us to lean into the Mantra: Where love is deep, much can be accomplished. Use the uncertain times to open your eyes and your ears and your heart and to pay attention to what you are doing and seeing and experiencing, and to discern what you love. Then lean into that love, because that love will lead you to the next step, even if it doesn't answer all of the questions or uncertainties you are grappling with.

On a different, but related note, I want to clear up one terrible idea which is the phrase: "do what you love and you will never work a day in your life." Let me tell you as someone who loves her work, nothing could be further from the truth. I work everyday, but when I love my work I wake up in the morning and I look forward to my day and I feel my brain on fire with interesting things to think about and ideas to consider and people to meet; and I love my work; and I work very hard. Most of the people I know who love their work also work very hard.

But when you deeply love your work and when you do what you love, you feel a tremendous sense of purpose and you bring into the world things that are desperately needed. You bring more love into your interactions with other people; people who are desperate for love because we're all in need of love.

Beyond work, in the sense of one's professional life, there are the greater problems of the world. I think we all look around and we see things that trouble us, whether it's racism, or the environment, or deepening cultural divisions.

And even in these problems I encourage you to cultivate and to practice love. Love your neighbor. Love people you disagree with and try to understand them; try to find things in common. There are so many problems that we can solve, if we're working together on them and if we're working with love: Where love is deep, much can be accomplished.

When you are called to work on one of these problems by following your love, and by feeling that feeling that you can't ignore, that you need to step in and do something or say something: please do it; the world needs you.

And speaking of you:

The world needs you to be who you are: your unique self with your unique gifts, your unique Works, your unique ways of thinking about the world. So please love yourself deeply, and find out what it is that makes you who you are.

When you encounter an experience that challenges you, trust that you are going to learn more about yourself and about what you love, and you're going to find ways to lean into what you love and to approach the work with love.

Well, while I stand by everything I've said so far, it has been quite philosophical. Now I'd like to give some very concrete and specific advice: one piece of advice for those who anticipate entering the music industry as a professional, and one piece of advice to those who are not anticipating entering the music industry for your professional life.

To those who are going to pursue music, first I want to say: Yes! This is wonderful news! You are in for a wild and wonderful ride.

My advice to you is to take advantage of Suzuki teacher training and become trained so that you can pay your rent and put food on the table, all while making the world a better place with more music.

You are someone with a pedigree when you graduate from The Preucil School of Music, and when you combine that pedigree with teacher training you will find yourself with doors that open wide to hire you, or you can open your own studio and be your own boss.

You may end up finding that you want to devote most of your time to teaching; you may also find that this is part of a portfolio that helps you to have a rich and fulfilling and financially stable career. Most professional musicians are portfolio musicians.

To those who are not planning to pursue music as a profession (first, it's not too late to change your mind!) - I want to remind you that the world needs you and your understanding of music. The Arts in this country depend on your generosity with donations to Arts organizations throughout your life.

There are nations in the world that prioritize funding the arts and recognize that the arts are an important part of any healthy economy but in the United States, our government is very limited in its support of our arts sector, and relies on the generosity of individuals to keep a healthy abundance. Therefore: do not forget that where love is deep, much can be accomplished, and part of your love might well include making regular and generous donations to arts organizations.

I want to thank you all for listening and I want to encourage you to reach out to me if you ever need a sounding board for what you might want to consider for your work. I would be happy to give you advice or to listen or to share what I have observed throughout my quite diverse career in the music industry. I wish you every success, and I wish you, more than anything else, deep and much-accomplishing love.
