Director's Message By Sonja Zeithamel



Looking back over the year, it has been one of growth and development. As we prepare to turn the page to a particularly exciting year, we want to share the highlights of this past year by celebrating student accomplishments, recognizing faculty, staff, board and guild members who will be leaving their positions, and welcoming those who will be joining the school in 2024-25. In addition, we have included some of our initial plans to celebrate the school's 50th Anniversary with the community. As always, I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to the faculty, staff, students, parents, volunteers and members of our Board of Directors and Preucil Guild for their continued support of the school and its mission.

50 Years and a Music School

In 1974, after Doris Preucil's trial Suzuki violin program was such a success, she had a dream to start a music school. She wanted a place where teachers could come and be trained in the Suzuki Method, that included a program with multiple instruments and a more complete musical experience. I first learned about Doris's dream in 1974 over lunch in the cafeteria at the American Suzuki Institute in Stevens Point, Wisconsin. I vividly remember this conversation. That fall, I received a phone call about a potential property she wanted me to see, and then the dream became a reality. Preucil School of Music opened on January 2, 1975. While perusing through the school archives, I ran across a newsletter from March 1975. Doris wrote:

"What an exciting new year, with the opening of our school! How satisfying it is to have the various musical activities all under one roof---I hope the children think of this as their musical center. I am so proud of our faculty---all fine musicians who are deeply concerned with doing their best for your children."

What happened in the following decades is now history, but it is important to note that everything started with a dream and a belief in establishing a community music school in Iowa City.

Preucil School will celebrate 50 years during the 2024-25 academic year, beginning August 1, 2024. Besides the normal student events that will take place, we are happy to announce several special recitals, featuring friends and alumni of our school. Our entire year will provide us with many opportunities to celebrate our amazing past, present and future with the community, reconnect with alumni, and thank those who have supported the school over the years. In the words of our founding director, Doris Preucil, "It is time to re-inspire the excitement of our beginnings and to remind our community that we are here for them."

A Commissioned Piece

In honor of the 50th Anniversary, the school commissioned Peter Bloesch (PSM'82) to compose a piece for the Preucil School String Orchestra, which will be premiered at the Annual String Concert at Hancher Auditorium on February 2, 2025. For this special anniversary performance, alumni and former faculty will be part of the orchestra. Please turn to page 22 for more information.

"Alumni and Friends" Concert Series

Another highlight of our 50th Anniversary celebration will be a special concert series featuring "Alumni and Friends." The fall concerts will include a chamber music recital with violinist Alexandra Preucil, violist Antoine Tamestit, and pianist Ksenia Nosikova. Works by Mozart, Martinů and Bartók will be performed on Monday, September 30 at 7:30pm in the Voxman Music Building Concert Hall. The second recital will feature a young, award-winning string quartet from Juilliard. The Dolphins Quartet will perform Tuesday, November 19 at 7:30pm at The Englert Theatre.

In the spring, along with our Annual String Concert, concert pianist Orion Weiss, friend and alumni of the school, will present a recital on Saturday, March 8 at 7:30pm at The Englert Theatre. Future concerts in this series are yet to be determined. All concerts are free and open to the public.

A special thank you to the University of Iowa School of Music for allowing Preucil School to use Voxman Concert Hall for the September 30th event. The University has been a wonderful friend of the school over the last 50 years and we greatly appreciate this collaboration.






On April 26, several of the Winter Chamber Program groups performed an informal concert in Walder Hall for the Thursday and Friday group classes.

Preschool Storytellers By Tricia Windschitl

"We are all storytellers. We all live in a network of stories.

There isn't a stronger connection between people than storytelling."

--Jimmy Neil Smith, Director of the International Storytelling Center



This year my class journeyed into stories, imagined and real, and discovered we all have stories to tell. The preschoolers' stories became a vehicle to self-expression—a way of explaining themselves, their world, their thoughts, their

imaginations, and experiences. While it is so important to tell our own stories, it is equally important to listen to others' stories. And so, we practiced listening to one another, leaning in with curiosity and questions.

Many days children would enter school saying, "I have a story to tell." And some days not everyone got a turn because there were so many stories to

tell. "There is no greater agony than bearing an untold story inside you." — Maya Angelou. But they patiently waited for their turns and in the meantime listened to each other's stories. "Stories create community, enable us to see through the eyes of other people, and open us to the claims of others." —Peter Forbes.

Our storytelling routines provided excitement and comfort to our day. Storytelling brought us together in ways books and videos cannot. Storytelling is a shared experience. And when it is sustained over time, it becomes a character itself—The Story.





Real-Life-True Stories vs Imaginary Stories



The real events that children experience, the stories that make up their daily lives, hold deep significance. These events, often trivial to adults, shape their understanding and knowledge of the world. These are the stories that enter the classroom with, "Tricia, guess what happened!?" and I'm told about a fall on the way to school, a bug discovered at home, or an eventful night of thunder and lightning. Sometimes the events are more serious: "My dad is leaving our house and moving to a different house" or "my grandpa died." These stories came to be known as "true-life-real stories" in our classroom (think The Moth Story Hour for preschoolers). On the other end of the spectrum are the wonderfully creative stories that only children can imagine. Many great children's authors emulate the whims and fancy of childhood imaginings. While the adult storytellers' narrative construction is more sophisticated, chil-

dren's stories are no less awe-inspiring, bringing wonder and joy to the audience. We called these stories "imaginary stories", and they often began with "Once upon an imagination..." These stories were revered in our classroom as much as the most prominent children's authors.



In November as our storytelling was growing, I asked my friend Jennifer New if she would be interested in listening to children's real-life stories. Jennifer normally works with adults through her organization, Hypha. She helps individuals and organizations connect with their community through storytelling. I wanted to bring in an "expert story listener." Children

feel valued and validated when their stories are heard. Their experiences take on shape and become meaningful parts of their personhood. Jennifer introduced herself to the preschoolers as a "story forager," a title that stuck with them. She visited often, collecting the preschoolers' stories of friend-

ship, lost items, torn Stuffies and Stuffies stowed away in backpacks, new toys, adventures down a water slide, death of a beloved grandfather, a nightmare, a story created from a mess, and more.

Our stories won't end here--we all have stories and stories and stories to tell.

From the moment I walked into my first *Music Together* class with my own little ones over a decade ago, I've been captivated by the magic it creates for children and families. Now, I'm thrilled to be back at Preucil as a *Music Together* teacher, sharing that joy with a new generation of music makers.

My name is Catharine Gartelos, and I can't wait to fill our fall sessions with music, laughter, and unforgettable memories. I have had so much fun teaching during the summer session. As a former lead teacher at Preucil Preschool and a current preschool educator in the ICCSD, I'm pas-

sionate about nurturing young minds through music and movement, friendship, culture, and community. I'm also excited to embark on a Ph.D. journey in special education at the University of Iowa starting this fall.

Just this summer, I witnessed the pure magic of *Music Together* unfold before my eyes. One of my six-month-old students went from looking at me like I was an alien to bursting out in laughter in just two weeks! It's incredible how these little ones soak it all in, their minds like sponges. And then, boom! Their personalities shine through in the most adorable way. Watching their expressive language blossom is an absolute joy when they start with receptive language taking it all in as we sing and dance. I also love seeing the grown-ups let loose and be silly. Their playful spirits not only entertain the kids but also create a warm and inviting atmosphere that's perfect for learning and bonding.

Preucil is dedicated to igniting a lifelong love of music in the hearts of our youngest music makers. Our *Music Together* classes are a playful adventure where children and their grown-up buddies explore rhythm, song, culture, and community together. Imagine weekly gatherings filled with giggles, swaying bodies, and the simple joy of making music as a family. That's what you'll find in our 45-minute classes for newborns to five-year-olds. Over ten weeks, we built a vibrant community of music makers who grow and learn together. The fall session of Music Together will begin September 9. 

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Graduation 2024



Senior graduation took place on Sunday evening, May 19, in Wilson Auditorium. The evening's speaker was Adam Zabner (PSM 2017). Rep. Adam Zabner was elected to the Iowa House in 2022. He grew up in Iowa City and studied viola for 15 years at Preucil with Gwen Ying and Marit Hervig. After graduating from City High, he majored in Neuroscience at the University of Chicago. Preucil inspired a love and appreciation of music; he often listens to IPR Classical on drives to and from the State Capitol in Des Moines. Following is Adam's message to the graduates.

Good evening. It is a joy to be here tonight to celebrate so many talented young musicians, and also some violists. I was a Preucil kid from age three to age 18, a period that still makes up the majority of my lifetime. Two years ago, I was elected to represent lowa's 90th District in the lowa House of Representatives. It is truly an honor to have Preucil in my district and to have the opportunity to speak to all of you today.

I can't give you much advice about how to be a better musician. Instead, I would like to tell you a bit about how my experience at Preucil has impacted my life and share some ideas about how you can learn from your experiences at Preucil.

I want to talk about the queasy feeling in the pit of your stomach. Every single time I performed on the viola, from three to 18, I felt my heart rate go up and my stomach turn. In fact, I kind of feel like that right now as I stand here speaking to this distinguished group.

Nothing at Preucil ever made me more anxious than playing for the First Lady of China. The summer before my freshman year of high school, I had the opportunity to travel to China with PSSO as the last chair violist. I sat so far back that I didn't even have a stand partner. At that time, Xi Jinping had recently become the President of China. While we now know him as a repressive leader, at that time he was seen as a potential reformer. Knowing that President Xi had spent time living in Muscatine, my dad suggested that I reach out and invite him to our concert.

The idea of reaching out to a foreign leader gave me that queasy feeling, but I did it. I wrote a letter and sent it to the American Embassy in China and the Chinese Embassy in the United States. To my surprise, I was soon on a Skype call with the Chinese Embassy. I'll add another piece of advice here: if you're going to invite the Chinese Premier to your concert, I'd recommend giving a heads-up to the folks at Preucil organizing the trip. It probably would have been helpful for them to know why the Chinese Embassy, which had all of our passports as we applied for our visas, was calling to ask questions about a 13 –year-old named Adam Zabner.

This risk paid off with the opportunity for us, a group of young musicians from the fifth biggest city in Iowa, to play for the First Lady of China alongside the best Chinese youth orchestra. Before the concert, a group of us got to personally meet the First Lady. The group included Preucil Director Sonja Zeithamel, Conductor Anthony Arnone, the concertmaster, the soloists, and me, the last chair violist who sat so far back that I didn't even have a stand partner.

Many of you have practiced and performed enough that playing your instrument feels as natural as riding a bike. I'd guess that you still feel anxious before you perform. I think that you should look for experiences that make you feel that way. I am one of lowa City's many Caitlin Clark megafans. What I most respect about Caitlin's game is her performance under pressure. With tens of thousands of screaming fans, at the end of a tight game, she wants the ball in her hands and she delivers. In a recent article, ESPN reporter Wright Thompson reported that the Iowa women's basketball team works with a sports psychologist. In one exercise, the psychologist had the team go around and share when they felt stressed and anxious and how they responded to those feelings. About Clark, Thompson writes, "Finally it was Caitlin's turn. She seemed a little embarrassed. 'I never am,' she said."

The rest of us are not Caitlin Clark. The only way for us to avoid feeling anxious would be to step off the court. Most of us feel that queasy feeling we need to perform. I hope that your experience at Preucil has taught you to practice, prepare, and face that feeling. My advice is to continue to put yourself in situations that challenge you. I can tell you firsthand that it is scary to put your name on a ballot. It is scary to knock on a stranger's door to talk about politics. It is scary, as a freshman member of the minority party, to stand up and express an opinion that you know most of your colleagues disagree with.

I think that fear signifies that you are doing something important. I think that fear motivates you to prepare to do your best and to be your best. That very fear is what makes a successful performance feel so good. You would not feel anxious to perform music if you didn't care about the music that you were playing or the people that you were playing for.

You should find something you care about enough that the idea of failure makes you feel sick. You should do your best to prepare, and practice, and know what you're getting into, and if you fail you should try again. In the last two years, I've introduced 23 bills to try and solve problems that I hear about from lowans. The idea of any of them not becoming law makes me sick. One out of the 23 has passed the House and the Senate, been signed by the Governor, and become law. Believe it or not, I find a 1/23 batting average so encouraging that I'm running for reelection.

One more note. Find a way to keep music in your life. Many of you are going off to colleges where there will be opportunities to continue playing music. I didn't after high school and I regret that. Whether or not you keep playing, find opportunities to appreciate music. When I was in college, I found out I could go to any Chicago Symphony performance with \$5 to \$15 student tickets. I found out that my University hosted free jazz shows almost every Friday night. I went as often as I could and it enriched my college experience, and not just because the symphony makes a great first date.

In Iowa City, we are incredibly lucky to have Hancher, the Englert, endless free concerts at Voxman, and countless other opportunities to listen to live music. Take advantage of your Preucil education and use it to appreciate that music. Invite your Preucil friends to join you. My best days in Des Moines are the days I drive in completely lost in whatever is playing on IPR Classical. When things go wrong, I often find myself listening to music. It almost always makes me feel better.

Congratulations on graduating from the wonderful Preucil School of Music. Now is the time to find something you care enough to make you queasy, ask your Preucil friends for help in whatever is next for you, and never stop appreciating music.

Suzuki Summer Institutes By Jean Littlejohn

I'm the mom of two Preucil students, and they have both enjoyed attending Suzuki summer institutes. At Suzuki camp, my kids had the opportunity to have private lessons, play in chamber music groups, take technique classes, and play in orchestras and group classes. Having the opportunity to interact with new teachers for a week or two can be so beneficial. Sometimes having a new teacher explain a technique to you makes it stick, even if (especially if?) it's something your home teacher has been telling you for months! It can be helpful for a student to realize that their home teacher is not the only one with a passion for bow holds or hand position.

From the perspective of a musician who didn't grow up with Suzuki instruction, I think the Suzuki institutes provide a powerful sense of connection. A student gets thrown in a class with a bunch of strangers from different places, but they all have something important in common, something that they all practice regularly. The message is, you belong! You are already fluent in the secret language: you know how to play *May Song* (or whatever the piece is) by heart! That feeling of belonging and confidence can take a student a long way.
